PUBLIC POLICY REPORT – AUGUST:

WOMEN TAKE ON MORE STUDENT DEBT THAN MEN ... BUT ARE PAID LESS AFTER COLLEGE

Deeper in Debt: Between 1976 and 2014 the price of college attendance more than doubled, but household incomes barely budged. Today most students must bridge the gap between income and cost with student loans—followed by student debt. Women take on more loans and take longer to repay their debt, thus women hold almost two-thirds of the outstanding student loan debt in the United States.

Following graduation, women repay their loans more slowly than do men, in part because of the gender pay gap, and they are also more likely to struggle economically during repayment. This means that women may have to put off saving for retirement, buying a home, or starting a business.

Student debt is a systemic and national problem that disproportionately impacts women. AAUW members can help make changes to reduce women's student loan debt burden:

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- 1. Congress must protect and expand Pell Grants for low-income students to reduce the amount of student loan debt they must take on to complete a degree.
- 2. State and federal legislators should increase funding for public colleges and universities and support efforts to move toward tuition- and debt-free options for students.
- 3. The department of education and lawmakers should make it easier for students to enroll in income-driven repayment options to help mitigate some women's financial difficulties.
- 4. Institutions can address the academic and financial needs of traditional and non-traditional students, such as access to childcare. Learn more and take action at AAUW National.

This might be a good time to write President Biden about the need to help people with student debt.

Celebrate the Anniversary of Women in the United States Winning the Right to Vote on August 26

On August 26, 1920, after three generations of an unrelenting, brilliant, courageous, political campaign, women in the United States won the right to vote. To honor and commemorate the historic date of the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution, Congresswoman Bella Abzug introduced a Congressional Resolution to ensure that this date would be commemorated with the designation of Women's Equality Day, which is celebrated on August 26th each year.

The Mendocino Women's Political Coalition celebrates the 101st Anniversary of Women Getting the Vote on August 21, 2021. We will use the Kelley House lawn from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. on August 21, 2021 to celebrate the passage of the 19th amendment, which gave American women the right to vote, with music by the Coast Women's Choir, oral histories, poetry and speeches. This is a proud tradition which we have enacted in 1995, 2000, 2005, 2010 and 2015. We will be asking the League of Women Voters and the Soroptimists to join us in this celebration.

We women living here today are the products of the suffragists who fought for us, for our right to vote, and for us to be able to vote to try to shape the way we want to live. Now we are celebrating the 101st Anniversary of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution that was ratified on August 26, 1920. The Mendocino Women's Political Coalition (MWPC) and the City of Ukiah have created two Centennial displays for the community to view beginning August 17th and will continue for two weeks to encourage increased awareness, education, and celebration. Take note of the banner across State Street at Clay Street and the unique display in the front of the Ukiah Civic Center, 300 Seminary Avenue, which will have exterior lighting of purple, gold, and white, the colors of the suffragists.
