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PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW California keeps track of the bills introduced in the California Legislature. We tracked those bills which deal with our bottom-line issues. Over 3,000 bills are introduced each year. Our legislative advocate tracks those bills and alerts us when we need to lobby our legislators. Here are the last of 2021 bills.

Legislative Updates

Our last five priority bills that were awaiting the Governor's signature have been acted on, here are the results:

SB 62 (requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment workers) SIGNED

AB 367 (free menstrual products must be provided in girls/women's bathrooms in schools) SIGNED

AB 887 (allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically) SIGNED

AB 123 (increases paid family leave benefits to 65 – 75% of regular pay) VETOED

AB 1074 (requires hotel and janitorial workers who have lost their jobs due the pandemic to be prioritized for hiring as businesses reopen) VETOED

AAUW IS LOCAL, STATE AND NATIONAL

When AAUW began in 1881, few women had the opportunity to pursue a degree—prompting founder Marion Talbot to support a fund for women's education. Today, women outnumber men in earning degrees at nearly every level. Yet our work is far from done.

Over the past 140 years, AAUW has evolved to become the leading voice in advancing gender equity in education and workplaces everywhere. Through research, education and advocacy, we're committed to ensuring that everyone gets the same opportunity to learn, earn and lead. Our programs aim at moving women forward—and we fight for policies that support our goals.

AAUW created research and project grants that allow women to return to school, to re-enter the workforce, and to give them the skills they need to be competitive in the workplace. It created "Selected Professions Fellowships" to bring more women into non-traditional fields such as law, business and medicine. Later the focus for these fellowships and grants evolved to cover science, technology, engineering and math as well.

AAUW's 1975–76 American Fellow Judith Resnik made history by becoming the second female astronaut in space. After she perished in the 1986 Challenger tragedy, AAUW members raised \$235,000 to fund the Judith Resnik American Fellowship endowment. AAUW has been empowering women as individuals and as a community since 1881. For more than 130 years, we have worked together as a national grassroots organization to improve the lives of millions of women and their families.

AAUW California will continue to embrace the advantages of the virtual world in 2021-22 by conducting another series of Zoom webinars on topics that promise to interest branch leaders, members, and the public. Several webinars will relate to this year's focus: "M&Ms: Marketing and Membership." Speakers will share ideas for building membership through marketing, publicity, advocacy, branch programs, etc. with a particular emphasis on engaging working and retirement age groups. As a resident of Mendocino County, you're invited to test your Internet speed. The County has launched a crowd-sourced speed-test that aspires to collect and share data about Internet availability in every region of Mendocino County.

Why? With historically unserved and underserved areas, where Internet service is poor or nonexistent, the pandemic highlighted the need for increased connection. Additionally, collecting this data will help the community develop policies and pursue funding to augment and facilitate the construction of needed "Last Mile" infrastructure now, or fill out the short form stating you have no internet connection at home.
